

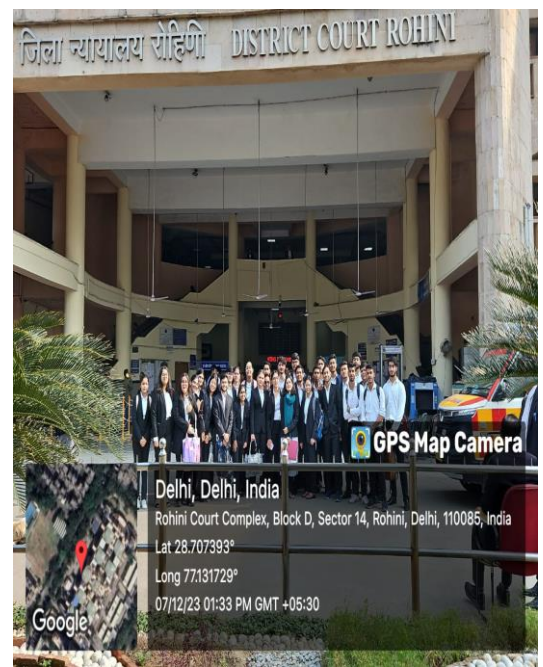
HON'BLE DISTRICT COURT, ROHINI VISIT 6th & 7th DECEMBER, 2023 (WEDNESDAY & THURSDAY)

CLS-GIBS, Delhi, organized a visit to the Hon'ble District Court Rohini for the students of BA & BBA LLB – 1 Semester. The visit was conducted for the students' on 6th & 7th December 2023 in starting from 11:00 A.M. to 4:00 P.M.

The purpose of the visit was to understand the working of a court, the nature of duties of the Judicial officers. The visit was to help understand the role of court in dispensing Justice in any case, the role of prosecutors in a case, the way a case proceeds in a court, the way judges, prosecutors and defence lawyers handle the case.

This gave students an opportunity to understand the actual need of co-ordination in the system of justice.





The day started with a basic introduction to the courtroom and its etiquettes. In the Courtroom No. 301, the presiding Justice was Ms. Shivali Bansal, Ld. ADJ. There were several ongoing proceedings which started with the case Suman Kapoor v. Krishan Kumar Khatri. In this case, the defendant admitted having received a sum of Rs. 35 lakhs by trying to sell off a property. But the plaintiff argued that he had given a sum of Rs. 40 lakhs to the defendant. It was a prima facie case, in which the plaintiff asked the court to demand at least a bank guarantee of the amount so given. The court asked Advocate P. R. Sharma to bring some laws on it and provided a new date (7th March, 2024) for the hearing.

Other cases included topics of CRPC, CPC and Suit for damages. In Shri Om v. Sandeep, the uploading of order was delayed. Under Section-151 of CPC a PIL was filed. This suit was regarding dispute of properties, in which the defendants after being given two notices by the Hon'ble court failed to be present for the hearings, for which the court subjected a heavy cost of Rs. 25000 on them. The proxy council requested to lower the fine. The court for this case was adjourned till the next hearing on 20 February, 2024.

In the Courtroom No.319, the presiding Justice was Sh. Ajay Narwal. The first case was Natasha Ahluwalia v. Rohit Ahluwalia, in which the justice ordered both the parties to be physically presented for the hearings; no video conferences would be entertained. Other cases included the

denial of Bail Bond, or one of the parties being absent from the court, or non-availability of the council.

Next the students explored The Mediation Centre. Mediation involves the intervention of a third person, or mediator, into a dispute to assist the parties in negotiating jointly acceptable resolution of issues in conflict. The mediator meets with the parties at a neutral location where the parties can discuss the dispute and explore a variety of solutions. Mainly disputes which are settled outside of court include Divorce cases, issues relating to tort, breach of a contract, family disputes, etc.

Last in series was the introduction of Delhi Legal Services Authority (DLSA) to the students. Delhi District Legal Services Authority is a Statutory Body and has been constituted under the Legal Services Authorities Act, 1987 with the motto “Access to Justice for All”. This Authority is undertaking various activities for making Access to Justice meaningful for all and to fulfil the mandate of the ‘Act’.
